Cover Photo

The photo on the front cover is there to promote the involvement of any member who has plants flowering and is unable to have it judged because of the meetings not being able to proceed. The plant on the front cover is Peter Fire "Torch" and is growing in a 125mm pot. Parents are Peter Pan and Winter Fire, registered in 1992. I have included this plant, to try to tell anyone who have plants in flower, what to do to have them judged. A plant like this would not normally warrant being on the front cover. It is there to try and get a virtual display of flowering plants happening each month.

We prefer to have a photograph of the entire plant (include the pot), another photograph of the flower spike, and a further photograph of the singe flower (three photographs). Try to choose a good background for the shots. A light blue or black sheet is great or use any convenient plain single colour background available. Do not photograph looking towards a strong light source. This photograph was taken in a bathroom (good bright light), using the wall tiles as the background (not ideal but OK). Photographs taken with a modern phone are usually good, or if you have a good quality camera, even better. We do not need high resolution photos, and if you do try to send very high resolution files over the internet, it will be slow. Files around 200k bytes are quite satisfactory. If your camera takes them at very high resolution, there is plenty of software available to reduce the size of the files.

Please send any photographs to <u>cymorchidssa@gmail.com</u> before the normal start time of our monthly meetings (8pm, fourth Wednesday each month). If you are unable to send pictures, please contact Graham Fear on 0421 053 951 or Graham Morris on 0419 823 724. Judges will do judging based on the quality of the plants, and not the quality of the photographs. Winning plants will be published in the following month's magazine and will also be used for end of season awards.

Should anyone have a plant they consider worthy of receiving an award, please contact our Registrar of Judges, Ben Knobben on 08 8356 0215 or <u>bcknob@adam.com.au</u>. Restrictions to group meetings may make it difficult for the judges, but if you consider you have an awardable plant, I am sure all attempts will be made to somehow judge it.

Alvin Bryant

It is with great sadness that we convey that Alvin Bryant passed away on the 11th April. Alvin made a huge contribution to hybridizing high quality cymbidiums, with many of the best cymbidiums being grown today, having their origins thanks to Alvin

Greg Bryant (his son) posted on his Facebook page as follows:

"Sad news. In the early hours of this morning, my father Alvin Richard Bryant passed away in Redcliffe Hospital, Brisbane. This followed treatment for the cancer he had been battling for some years. He was 93 years old."

I would like to add a little, based on some personal contact that I had with Alvin, many years ago.

In the mid to late 1970's, I was still learning about growing cymbidiums and decided that it would be good to start growing plants from flask. I wrote to Alvin Bryant and received his latest flask catalogue in the mail (no internet at that time). I also spoke to him on the phone and he kindly sent me a flask of clones, free of charge, to help me learn how grow plants from flask. None survived, but I learned a lot from his kind offering. A little later, I visited him at his nursery, in southern Sydney. He gave me some really good advice which changed my thinking on growing cymbidiums. It is still good advice today. He told me that if I wanted to be competitive in growing cymbidiums, and to have the latest and greatest cymbidiums available, I should grow top quality seedlings from the most successful hybridizers and not the latest mericones. If I were to seek and grow the best clones available at that time, I would forever be years behind the growers who originally flowered and then released them for sale. By the time I might be able to grow these latest and greatest clones to flowering, the successful hybridizers would have the next generation of seedlings flowering, and they would likely to be much better than the old clones. If I could get seedlings from the best hybridizers and grow them well, I could be competitive with them, flowering the best available varieties at the same time as the best growers in the world

At that time, there were some very exciting new parent plants becoming available. There was a host of new tetraploid parent plants appearing, produced by converting the diploid versions of many of the best diploid varieties available at the time. One particular new tetraploid plant, which caused a lot of excitement at the time, was Fanfare "St Francis" (4N). Alvin was one of the first hybridizers who offered seedling flasks, bred from Fanfare "St Francis" (4N). About that time, the crossing of Fanfare "St Francis" (4N) and Winter Fair started flowering. This crossing produced huge flower spikes, with big round flowers, at a quality rarely seen before. One particular unflowered seedling of this crossing was sold for about \$1000 (a huge amount at that time), even before it opened. Many thought this purchase was crazy, but that plant later named Winter Wonder was a huge breakthrough in breeding of high quality, early season large standard flowers.

I personally had a lot of success with another batch of seedlings from Alvin. I purchased a flask of Fanfare "St Francis" (4N) crossed with Zumma Boyd "Magnificent" and flowered many high quality big green standards from it. Even on first flowerings, on relatively small plants, most had huge numbers of flowers on each spike. I was a member of the Orchid Club of South Australia at that time, and exhibited one of them in the Royal Adelaide Show and won Grand Champion prize, which carried a cash prize of \$1000, and an Award of Merit (AM), which was huge for me at that time. It was named Valerie Brown "Eureka" (Valerie Brown was registered in 1981). Eureka had 27 big green flowers on a bolt upright flower spike when it won the award. It also was given the title of Champion of Australia at that time. On later flowerings it produced up to 33 flowers per spike. It did get criticised in some circles, as the flower spike was weak at the top, and needed support and ties right to the top flower.

The following year I also won a Grand Champion prize with another Alvin Bryant bred cymbidium. Alvin's crossing of Alvin Bryant x Luningrad Elanora (4N), named Cronulla in 1984, produced the variety Cronulla "Linda Morris" for me, and won Champion Cymbidium at the OCSA Winter Show on it's first flowering. A sibling to this plant, namely Cronulla "The Khan", has been hugely influential in the development of many of the best commercial and showbench cymbidiums in the world today.

There are plenty more good stories about Alvin. His contribution to cymbidium hybridizing was huge. We are fortunate to have his Son, Greg, and others continuing to build on the breeding breakthroughs which Alvin initiated.

There will be some First Strike roedenticide bait available from the trading table this month.


Packs of 10 baits \$5.00, Packs of 25 \$10.00 This new product is getting good reviews from growers interstate who have been
